Celebrating Catholic Schools

We concluded another successful Catholic Schools Week with our pep rally today. Throughout the week our students celebrated with a mix of fun dress up days, reflective spiritual opportunities, and a community spirit of giving back. Catholic Schools Week is not only a time to celebrate, but a time to reflect and give praise for all that we have been blessed with.

Over the past several weeks I have been meeting in neighborhoods such as Palmetto Bluff, Spring Island and Belfair to share the JPII story with potential leadership donors to the upcoming capital campaign. Since I am often meeting people for the first time, I spend time connecting them with our purpose and reason for being. As part of that presentation I share why Catholic schools are needed now more than ever. For our JPII community, these reasons can often be taken for granted, so let me share that same message with all of you.

- 1. In this time of mixed messaging coming at students from all different types of media, Catholic schools provide absolute truths according to scripture. We are clear on our beliefs and where they come from. Those truths bring a sense of comfort. It is because of those truths that Catholic schools can seamlessly integrate faith with reason, an almost impossible task absent the reliance on scripture.
- 2. Catholic schools reinforce the values that are taught at home. Parents know what they can expect when their child enrolls, and while students can stray from those values at times, the constant reinforcement allows us to develop character over time. The consistency from home to school is what often sets us apart.
- 3. Catholic schools can educate the whole person...mind, body and soul. While many schools might claim to educate the whole child, there is one missing critical element. As a public school educator of 29 years and a Catholic educator of 9 years, I have firsthand knowledge of the difference between the two. While public schools, and some private schools, can address mental and physical development, they cannot touch the soul, the spiritual part of our being that allows students to grow into adulthood with a strong moral compass to guide them in decision-making.

- 4. In the age of individualism, where people often put their own needs above those of others, Catholic schools develop the mindset of giving back to those less fortunate. No matter where our students come from, the concept of giving back through community service is fully engrained in them by the time they leave us. Living in the image of Jesus are not just words on a wall. What they choose to do with their gifts in life will be influenced by the time spent in a Catholic school.
- 5. Students in Catholic schools are in an environment where rigorous academic standards are the norm, and they are amongst teachers and students who help motivate them to reach those standards. While not every student succeeds academically, the seed of striving for excellence is planted. Students in Catholic schools in the Diocese of Charleston outperform public schools by a wide margin, as well as outperform Catholic schools across the nation. Assessment data backs up this claim. Students are well prepared for the next step they take in life based on their time spent in Catholic schools.

While some will claim the purpose of Catholic schools is to promulgate the faith for the future of the church, and that is partly true, the actual purpose extends far beyond this simple goal. Not all of our students are Catholic, and while some have become Catholic because of time spent with us, our ultimate goal is to form disciples of Christ who will live in His image for the rest of their lives, and there is no higher purpose than that.

New Applications Continue to Roll In

Following a very successful Open House last Sunday, we continue to see a record number of new applications. As of today, 81 applications have been submitted compared to 59 at this same time last year. That's a 37% increase! While not every application will matriculate to enrollment, early indications are that we will approach 400 students by next August. We do expect to be at capacity in some grades next year.

Congratulations Robotics

Last Saturday we managed to fit 15 IQ teams into the Commons and first floor hallway for our 2023 JPII IQ Warrior Challenge (we had a wrestling match that same day in the Athletic Center).

After 53 qualifying matches, JPII SHIELD Robotics teams were all ranked near the top with Team 61317X in 2nd place, Team 61317W in 3rd, and Team 61317M in 4th. WOW! In individual skills, Team 61317M placed 2nd with a total of 57 points. Team 61317X placed 3rd with 47 points. Team 61317W, not far behind, in 5th, with 39 points.

Teams 61317M and 61317W were paired in the finals scoring 53 points ending in 2nd place. Team 61317X was paired with Team 98999G from River Ridge and finished the day winning the Teamwork Champions Award with 63 points. Team 61317W was the recipient of the Excellence Award for their top performance in all areas including notebook and interview.



A great game on both ends of the floor from start to finish to defeat BA 60-51 on Monday night. The girls came out fighting and determined to win the boards and play tough defense. They looked confident and energetic all night. Brady Mahoney had 16 points, 20 rebounds, 3 steals, and 6 blocks. Lily Termini had 12 points and 14 rebounds. Our top 3 ranking in SCISA, winning 20 matches, hosting the first round of playoffs, finishing 3rd in the Hammond tournament and 5th in the Battery Creek tournament are all significant milestones for the wrestling program!
